Participant Requirements

- Learn the history, culture, art, politics, current events, literature and more of China, Japan and Korea during one-week seminar taught by university professors and guest lecturers.
- Participate in discussions and activities that showcase trends, highlight similarities and differences, and stimulate thought-provoking dialogue on Asia and the U.S.
- Translate the knowledge you gain into three lesson plans—one each on China, Japan, and Korea—that will challenge, educate and inspire your students to learn more about Asia.

Benefits In addition to the knowledge you will gain about East Asia, you will also receive the following benefits upon completion of the program requirements:

- \$400 personal stipend for your time and completed lesson plans
- \$200 worth of seminar texts and resources to add to your personal library
- \$300 resource buying grant for your school.**
- Option to purchase graduate credit.
