Bringing Korea into the Classroom: A Workshop for Ohio Teachers

June 8-9, 2017

This workshop offers 6-12th grade Ohio teachers an introduction to the rich history and culture of Korea. Through a series of small seminars held over two days on The Ohio State University campus, this free program is intended to provide teachers with the knowledge, resources, and expert guidance to allow them to incorporate or enhance curriculum about Korea into their classrooms.

Seminar: A series of presentations by university professors and guest lecturers cover topics about Korea that include:

- Korea's history as well as Korea's role in early print culture, the unique nature of the language, the nation's early economic and industrial development and its long history of political and diplomatic relations up to and including the Korean War, and even the growth in the international popularity of Korean food and drink.
- The nation's art and literature and contemporary Korean popular culture and the challenge of North Korea will also be covered.
- A session will be devoted to developing lesson plans for the classroom, which will be shared with all participants through the workshop's webpage.

Benefits: In addition to the knowledge participants will gain about Korea, additional benefits will include:

- \$200 personal stipend after completion of the workshop and lesson plan
- Parking tokens and lunch and parking provided each day (including Korean food)
- Education materials, including books about Korea
